#### Let every man say not merely "Christ is risen," but "I shall rise."

The Paschal Triduum, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Vigil of Easter, represent the culmination of all human history. All human goodness, all of our wickedness, all of our mediocrity culminates in the passion and death of Jesus on the cross, only to be met by the mercy and love of God in His Resurrection. Our annual reenactment of these events is an invitation to every one of us to enter into the Resurrection life of Jesus, where the sorrow becomes comfort and joy, strangers become neighbors, and sinners become redeemed. These days are even more than that—they become the model for how we live as Christians during the rest of the year in offering our whole selves to God and to one another in love.

These days are packed with centuries old symbolism. Maundy Thursday commemorates the institution of the Eucharist as the prologue to the suffering and death of Jesus. This year we will include the washing of feet, as Jesus did at his Last Supper. This is a reminder that I, your priest, am your servant, and also a reminder of how all Christians should care for one another. After the Eucharist, the reserved sacrament is placed on the altar of repose, and we will reenact the watch the disciples kept at Gethsemane as Jesus waited for his terrible fate. The church will be ritually stripped of decoration so that it stands stark and empty on Good Friday.

Good Friday is a stark memorial of the death of Jesus. This year we will read the Solemn Reproaches, which is a poem describing a court case between God and his people. The merciful works of God are placed in ironic contrast to humanity's treatment of Jesus. While the Reproaches are read, we will celebrate the ancient ritual of "Creeping towards the Cross." A wooden cross is set before the people, and all have an opportunity to come up and offer the Cross adoration as a sign of gratitude for Jesus' work for us.

Finally, the Great Vigil of Easter stands as the climax of the Christian year. This year we will be celebrating the Vigil here with our friends from St. Luke's, Springfield. We will begin in the courtyard with the lighting of the new fire, for Jesus is the light of the world, and process into the dark church. As the sun sets, we will recount God's works of mercy throughout history which are called "the Prophecies." This has long been considered the prime moment to be baptized—going under the water is said to represent death, while coming out of the water represents rising again in the resurrection with Jesus. Finally, as the Gloria is sung, the lights are thrown on, bells are rung, and joyful songs break out at the final triumph of Jesus over sin and death. Of course, Easter actually concludes after church, when we gather with our friends and family for a great Easter dinner and are glad for God's works for us.

Last month I wrote about the theological concept of *anamnesis*. This is reenacting the events of the past in order to make them present in the here and now. There are lots of moving pieces in this Great Mystery Play we undertake every year as we make God's works of grace present in our liturgy. I invite everyone to find some little part to do. Having our feet washed on Maundy Thursday, keeping watch with Jesus at the Altar of Repose, serving as an acolyte or doing a reading—no part is small in a play! A sign-up sheet is available in the lobby. Happy Easter to all of us. The Lord is risen indeed.

#### About our Church Yard

The Vestry is pleased to announce a major renovation of our church yard set to begin in April. A church yard is a living, growing thing, and the decades have slowly but dramatically changed the character of our lawn. Small trees have become large trees that crowd each other and block the sun from the other plants, which has resulted in erosion in some places. The yew hedge has begun dying off as there is less and less new growth to trim every year. The wooden retaining wall along the path is collapsing. The project will replace the yew hedge with boxwood and flowering plants, give the trees more room to grow by taking down one of the trees, and the wooden retaining wall will be replaced with stone. The plans for the yard are on display in the lobby. Thank you to Chuck Crim, Adah Mitchell, and Jim Herget for leading this project for us!
