




Trinity Topics

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“He that eateth my flesh, and drinketh my blood, dwelleth in me, and I in him.”

- John 6:56

The central proposition of liturgy is the motto “Lex Orandi, Lex Credendi,” which literally means “the law of prayer is the law of faith.” That is, the way we pray is an expression of what we believe. In Anglican history, people have literally died over the question of whether the people should kneel to receive Communion, whether candles should be on the altar, and even what the priest should wear during services. Puritan pastors would rather die than wear a surplice because they felt donning mystical garment for services expressed a pagan theology of sacrifice apart from the one sacrifice of Jesus on the cross. We see controversies about liturgy even in the New Testament, with Church leaders struggling to answer questions of how non-Jews fit into the assembly or what sorts of head coverings liturgical leaders should wear.

These tensions are the struggle to express what we believe in the way we pray as a community. On the other hand, what we do in liturgy reinforces what we believe. When, for example, we kneel to receive holy communion we put ourselves in posture of awe of God’s works for us. We have images of saints in our church to encourage us by their example and to remind us of the enduring presence of the saints in our lives—no one who dies in the Lord is truly gone but is alive in Jesus.


I bring all this to mind because the beauty of our liturgy and our building are such important parts of our identities as Episcopalians. What we do in our worship is more than beautiful—it is an expression of what God is doing for us and of our faith in God. These are often the first things people notice when they visit an Episcopal Church for the first time. As Episcopalians believe that the Christian life is not only a matter of what we say or believe, but also of what we do—both inside church and in the world.

Few celebrations better express this dynamic than the Feast of Corpus Christi. This celebration originated in the 12th century and became hugely popular across Europe almost instantly. During this service, we boldly assert our conviction that Jesus is really and truly present in the Eucharist by holding a great procession with it, making loud proclamation that Our Lord well and truly dwells among us. It concludes with the priest using the consecrated host to bless the congregation, which we assert is Jesus himself offering the world his blessing. In this ritual, the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist goes from being a confusing and abstract doctrine to being a literal manifestation of God’s enduring presence to us.

I invite all of us to experience this great mystery of the Christian Faith at our cathedral this June. It will take place on **Thursday, June 15, at 5:30pm.** It will be held at **St. Paul’s Cathedral, 815 S 2nd St, Springfield.** If you need or can offer a ride to the service, please let the parish office know. A reception will follow the service.
