“The people which sat in darkness saw great light; and to them which sat in the region and shadow of death light is sprung up.” –

Matthew 4:16

In ages past, before the marvels of central heating and electric lights, it was impossible to forget the encroaching cold and darkness of December. Imagine spending whole weeks huddled around a feeble fire in the darkness with the people you love, telling stories and waiting for the light to come. This is the setting for Christmas in the Northern Hemisphere. If a celebration in the miserable cold and darkness seems strange, think about what you did while the last blizzard was coming down. In Boston we would sit together in the warmth of the apartment all day eating cake and drinking coffee. Before the hassle of digging out, the ordinarily busy city sat in silence as people skied up and down Commonwealth Avenue. The very oldest tradition was to tell ghost stories on Christmas (What is Dickens' *A Christmas Carol*, after all, but a ghost story?), which might seem yet more strange, but what better than a good fright to make you hug your family closer and appreciate the light a little more?

We Christians are not unique in finding a little light in the darkness of winter, but we do have our own themes in our winter celebration. The literal darkness of winter is reflected in the figurative darkness of the Christmas story. It begins with the themes of Advent. The injustice of empire in the chaos of the census, the economic uncertainty of a homeless family ready to have a child, the petty grasping of our rulers, the terror of the slaughter of the innocents, these are all realities that lurk in our newspapers to this day, these 2,000 years later. Christmas bring us to the bigger picture. In this darkness, the Lord who made heaven and earth is acting in mysterious ways. “Unto us a child is born!” So what? More children are born all the time, and this child is homeless no less. What irresponsible parents! “This child will be called ‘God with us.’” God is with us in a world that is so broken, so unfair, so second rate? “Indeed, God is with us, even unto the end of the age, Amen!”

Even in the literal and figurative darkness of our world, we still have each other, and now we have God with us too, who Himself is all light, warmth, and love. That is a very great reason to celebrate indeed. For at least a little while, we have a chance to forget our problems and remember the people we have been given. For at least a little while, our hearts can be open wide with generosity, gratitude and mercy for all. We can forget about the struggle of life for at least a day and remember the many blessings we have with a mighty feast, presents, and the old songs that make us feel better. There can be a day when war can cease and politics can be off the tv. This is the season to recall the world that God has imagined for us, and what his birth as a little baby in Bethlehem was meant to bring about.

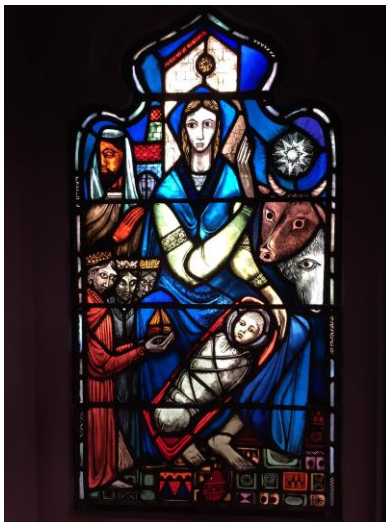
