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"Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, you are mine."— Isaiah 43:1

The following is the address delivered by Fr. Brooks at the 2019 Annual Parish Meeting:

Let us take this moment right now to thank God for another year of his grace, and pray that he will be our defender still in the coming year. For my part, I offer thanksgiving to God that I am your priest. You take time out of your week just to listen to me talk, you invite me into your private moments of joy and sorrow, you care for and support me and my family, and in the coming year I can only strive to be worthy of all this trust you put in me.

This meeting calls for some reflection on both the past year and also the year ahead of us. Praise God for the uncountable ways the members of this parish have contributed to our congregational life in this past year! The Bible says we are the light of the world; in a world that is increasingly lonely and secularized, it will fall to Trinity Church to show Jacksonville what it means to be a true community where everyone has a seat at the table, and everyone has a contribution. I am happy to say that our members actively and joyfully claim this high calling. It is this devotion, this energy that will show the City of Jacksonville the possibility of God's Kingdom in the here and now.

Our average Sunday attendance remained steady a second year in a row in an age of relentless declines in religious participation across all churches and public institutions. We also see a high level of participation in weekday services. Attendance isn't everything, of course, but it can be a sign of congregational health. We will continue to face the challenge in the coming year, unfortunately, and we will have to continue actively discerning as a community how we can make Jacksonville aware of the great miracle that happens in our walls every single week. The goal in the coming year will not be church growth in itself, but church health. A healthy community where people are properly equipped for mission will often be a growing church, but God's mission is not merely filling the pews.

I am also happy to report a sizable increase in the size of our average pledge. Praise God for your generosity. Active stewardship is an essential part of healthy congregational life—it's harder to proclaim God's Word to Jacksonville where we are all worried about finances. Your generosity this year pushes us toward greater reliance on pledges rather than our endowment, which not only draws souls into active investment in our community today, but also ensures the future needs of the parish will be provided for. It is, indeed, exactly our decades of financial responsibility that forms a core part of our secure finances today. The blessings of God grow more and more in our lives every day, and I hope in the coming year we can continue discerning ways, both as a community and as individuals, that we can push ourselves into greater reliance on pledges instead of endowment funds.

Of course, there are many ways that people can contribute to our common life. Our building is busy practically every day of the week. This parish recognizes the important fact that Church happens every day of the week because the prayers of the Church never cease. It is furthermore a task for every member, not only for the priest—my job as priest is to equip God's saints to do this holy work. It is a sign of our congregational health that we have many hands involved in our day to day life. Thank God for that, and in the coming year I hope we can grow this grace more and more. I pray we can find ways of proclaiming this grace not only inside our church but outside a well. AMEN.

A Course in Anglican History: Part IX

After crushing the Pilgrimage of Grace, King Henry VIII soured not only on monasticism, but on all religious dissent from any party, including Protestants. While Roman Catholics continued to be charged with loyalty to the pope, Henry had little taste for further reform. Henry made definitive statements of his Catholic churchmanship by personally presiding over the heresy trial of a Protestant for denying the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist in 1538, and by venerating a crucifix on Good Friday in 1539. Protestant theologians sent by German princes to encourage reforms in the English Church were expelled. After several years of Protestant advances in the Church, the *Six Articles* of 1539 reaffirmed a sundry list of Catholic practices such as clerical celibacy and private masses. Protestants who had gotten ahead of Henry's reforms hastily put their novelties away. Married priests (including Archbishop Thomas Cranmer) hid their wives, masses in English vanished, and bishops who refused to recant Protestant views were forced to resign. Somehow, both Catholics and Protestants found themselves persecuted in England, leaving Henry isolated for a season from both sides of the Reformation.
