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"Praise the LORD! I will give thanks to the Lord with my whole heart, in the company of the upright, in the congregation.

Great are the works of the Lord; they are pondered by all who delight in them."

—Psalm 111:1-2

The Psalms have been the prayer of the Church for two thousand years. A close reading of the Psalms reveals a recurring narrative pattern. The Psalmist finds himself in dire straits. Sometimes the crisis is physical infirmity or financial distress. Sometimes the Psalmist is the target of mocking or social ostracism. The Psalms contain times of loneliness and disaster. Mankind has faced the same problems for millennia. Sometimes the Psalmist admits that his crisis is the just consequence of his own foolish decisions, though just as often, the Psalmist maintains his innocence before circumstances that are beyond his control. In the depths of his misery, however, the Psalmist recalls the story of God. He is certain that God hears the cry of the needy and knows that God has acted mightily in the past to save. The Psalmist is certain that God's work is not only in the past and that God will act to save him in his own day. So, the Psalmist strikes something of a deal with God. He doesn't presume to be in any position to bargain with God, but rather he wants to give something in return for God's loving kindness. "If you grant my prayer, O Lord," the Psalmist says, "I will tell everyone what you did so the whole world can know you are the God who hears prayers!"

Christians meditate on the psalms because this is the same pattern of Christian life. We know God is good because those who have gone before us have testified to God's work in their lives. Some of this testimony has been recorded in the Bible, and most of us became Christians because of the faith given to us by our family or friends. We attend church to hear the Word of God preached to be continually renewed in this story, because the anxieties and crises of life can make us lose sight of this story. Inspired by God's works in the past, we are reminded to pray in our own day. We are certain this work is going on among us today because God has not changed since the days he walked among us performing miracles in Israel so long ago. When we discern these miracles and mighty acts that God is performing in our own lives, we have a duty to proclaim what God has done for us so that the story of the Bible can go on and continue to inspire the world to have faith.

This is our mission at Trinity Church, both as individuals and as a community: to hear the story of God, to pray to God, and to proclaim (through word and deed) God's works to a world that truly needs to hear that God does care for them. People today put their faith in many things that are not worth their faith, but how are they to know to put their trust in God if his own Church does not tell them? You are called to proclaim God's works, and you must read the Bible to find the way that God has prepared just for you to do it. Lent is a good time to renew our commitment to this mission, and this can begin with careful, daily reading of the Psalms. In reading the Psalms we carry on a story that has been going on since the earliest days of the Bible.

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A Course in Anglican History: Part LX

Until the modern era, every Anglican church prominently featured large boards lavishly painted with the Ten Commandments, the Apostles Creed, and the Lord's Prayer. They originated with Queen Elizabeth I, who in 1561 ordered that "God's Precepts" be displayed on the wall behind the Communion table in every church. They took the place previously occupied by images of the Virgin Mary, the saints, and the crucifixion, a firm declaration that the Protestant Word had replaced Catholic iconography. This practice was carried over to the American colonies, and these boards are still found in many churches constructed in the colonial era. They did not represent everything Christianity had to say, but they did represent "the basics" that even the Common Man could understand. All people were expected to recite them from memory to be Confirmed. Their place above the Communion table reminded all people receiving the Eucharist of the meaning of their Communion and the obligations that came with it. The Ten Commandments represented Christian morality, the Apostles Creed represented Christian belief, and the Lord's Prayer represented the Church's life of prayer. These boards remained standard Anglican church accoutrements until the Victorian era, when crosses and candlesticks began to supplant their place (much to the displeasure of Protestant traditionalists). While hard to find today, these boards did represent a critical idea that Protestantism offers the world: that the call of Jesus demands that every member of the Church should be able to know with clarity what he believes and why he lives the way he does, and he must be ready to profess these things to the world.

Stations of the Cross

We will observe the Stations of the Cross in the church on Friday, March 22 at 6 pm. This short service is a meditation on Jesus' final steps toward his crucifixion and death and its significance for our lives today. It is an excellent spiritual preparation for Holy Week. It will be followed by a light supper of soup in the parish hall.

Holy Week and Easter Services:

Holy Week is the climax of the Christian year, culminating in the Paschal Tridium and Easter Sunday.

- Holy Week will begin with **Palm Sunday** on March 24. The 10 o'clock service on Palm Sunday will begin in the churchyard for the Procession of the Palms.
- The Paschal Triduum is one long, three-day service that begins on **Maundy Thursday**, March 28, at 7 pm. The service will include a watch at the Altar of Repose until midnight.
- **Good Friday** on March 29, will be celebrated at 7 pm with the traditional "Creeping Towards the Cross" and the recitation of the Solemn Reproaches.
- Holy Saturday, on March 30, at noon, will be a simple, meditative service of prayer as we prepare for the Vigil.
- Finally, the **Great Vigil of Easter**, celebrating Jesus' resurrection from the dead, will be celebrated on March 30, at 7:30 pm. This solemn and beautiful service will include the lighting of the New Fire, the reading of the Prophecies, and Renewal of our Baptismal Vows.
- Of course, we will gather on March 31, at 10 am for a joyous Festal Eucharist for **Easter Day**.
- The Paschal Triduum ends at sunset on Easter Day.
- Please make time to attend these services and consider inviting friends and neighbors to experience our worship.
