

Trinity Topics JUNE 2024

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"Now abideth faith, hope, charity, these three; but the greatest of these is charity."—1 Cor. 13:13

In the Christian calendar, Jesus has given his life to us, risen from the dead for us, and ascended into heaven where he lives for us. He has sent his Spirit to us on Pentecost, thereby handing over his ministry to the world to His chosen people. This season after Pentecost, called Ordinary Time on some liturgical calendars, is the season when Jesus hands his divine mission over to the Church. Vestments and altar hangings become green to represent the growth of this mission in the world, like the verdant growth of the corn on the endless fields that surround our city. The Epistles that follow the Gospels recount the beginning of the mission, and this mission goes on all these centuries later with us here at Trinity Church. For St. Paul, this mission is defined by "Faith, hope, and charity." It is exactly the things that Jesus has given us so abundantly that we must give to the world.

This passage for 1 Corinthians today is usually translated as "Faith, hope, and love," but the older translation of this passage makes an essential point. There are many kinds of love. The virtue that is so essential to the identity and mission of Jesus, and therefore of the Church today, is a specific kind of love. Charity is unrestrained, joyful generosity to others. It is the enthusiastic giving of self to all, especially to the poor. The Gospels state that Jesus came first of all to the poor. "Blessed are you who are poor, for yours is the kingdom of God." (Luke 6:20) So must our mission as Trinity Church be—to those among us who the hungry, those who are homeless, the outcast and the suffering. I feel it is essential to understand that the poor are not "out there." There are people right here in Jacksonville, our neighbors, our coworkers, our friends, who do not know God's abundance. This is no fault of God's. If anyone is in want in Jacksonville, it is because Trinity Church, God's chosen people, are called to give supply their needs. God help us if we keep this abundance in our own pockets rather than giving it to its rightful owners!

God's mission for us this summer is to ensure that everyone in Jacksonville comes to know God's generosity. We thank God that the need is clear and the action we must undertake is straightforward. The Jacksonville Area Community Food Center has been greatly strained to meet our community's needs. In this newsletter will be a list of food items that the Food Center is in particular need of, which can be left in the bin in the hallway next to the parish hall. Even more critical for the Food Center is financial support. God is calling on all of us to earn a thicker soul through a thinner wallet, by making a generous monetary offering to support the Food Center. Simply designate the offering as going to the Food Center, and the Church can make a massive difference in the life of Jacksonville. This season is for charity. I hope every one of us at Trinity Church hears of the need and remembers Isaiah writing "I heard the voice of the Lord saying, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" Then I said, 'Here I am! Send me."" (Isaiah 6:8)

A Course in Anglican History: Part LXIII

The first half of the eighteenth century was a golden age of philosophical thought. Philosophers from this era include such monumental names as René Descartes, David Hume, Immanuel Kant, John Locke, Jean-Jacques Rousseau, Adam Smith, Voltaire, and many others that changed Western discourse forever. Their ideas would eventually give rise to the American Revolution. Their first and foremost belief was rationalism—all beliefs, even the divinely revealed dogmas of the Church, had to be subjected to the rules of evidence and reason. The Church could hardly ignore this massive shift in Western thought. There were three main responses to rationalism. First was acceptance—the Deist option. Very few thinkers of this era could imagine that God did not exist at all, so they concluded that God was simply not involved in human affairs. He was an abstraction to be aspired to but didn't perform anything like miracles that might interfere with the laws of science. These thinkers saw the Church as serving an important social function but had little use for its dogmas. The second response was the Spiritualist option. The Quakers and Swedenborgian also had little use for the old dogmas of the Church and looked for spiritual truths in their own hearts. Finally, the Pietist option, championed by great preachers like John Wesley and Johnathan Edwards, saw emotion as a fully valid mode of knowing equal to reason. Their enthusiastic preaching and prolific hymns were intended to instill in believers the feeling of God's nearness. The old way of believing, centered on things like the Creeds and doctrinal confessions of the Reformation, did carry quietly on but tended to have little influence on theological discourse during the Age of Enlightenment. Deism, Spiritualism, and Pietism all still effect theological discourse today. Rationalism continues to be something that all believers must contend with.

Outreach Committee

\$150 for 1 middle school student to attend Camp Invention at Jacksonville High School. The camp focuses on Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM)

As you can see, there is a small sum left to be distributed which will be discussed at the August Vestry Meeting. A further note is that both the Western II Youth Camp board of directors and the middle school administrators are very appreciative of our church's support for students who otherwise might not be able to have these summer opportunities.

Please continue to bring empty egg cartons and food which is taken to the Food Bank on a regular basis. Checks are also always welcome.
